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21. General Architectural Description

The Double Happy Chinese Restaurant Building is a one-story rectangular building, measuring approximately 48' N-S by 54' E-W. Located at the southeast corner of Main and Spruce Streets in downtown Louisville, the building fronts onto a wide concrete sidewalk paralleling Main Street to the west. The building's north elevation fronts onto the sidewalk along Spruce Street, and an asphalt parking lot extends to the alley, behind the building to the east. The Louisville Public Library is beyond the alley to the east. The Melting Pot Restaurant abuts this building on the south.

The building is supported by a low stone foundation, and features salmon color vertical wood siding exterior walls, over wood frame construction. The building has a distinctive roof form, perhaps best described as a truncated front gable (please refer to photos), with a false front at either end of the facade (west elevation). The roof is covered with green asphalt shingles, and the eaves are boxed. There are no chimneys. Four sets of paired single-light fixed-pane storefront windows, with painted teal color wood frames, are located on the facade. The main entrance, located near the north end of the facade, features a stained natural brown wood-paneled door, with two upper sash lights, set within a recessed entryway. A small canvas awning projects out slightly over the sidewalk. Two sign bands on the upper facade wall advertise: DOUBLE HAPPY and CHINESE RESTAURANT. One other single-light fixed-pane storefront window, is located at the far west end of the north elevation. Above this window is another sign advertising the Double Happy CHINESE RESTAURANT. Multiple shed-roofed additions to the building's east (rear) elevation predate circa 1950. Two single wood-paneled doors enter the additions on the east elevation.

29.Construction History (include description and dates of major additions, alterations, or demolitions:

Maps produced by the Sanborn Map Company for insurance purposes in 1893, 1900, and 1908, provide evidence that the first building at this location was constructed prior to 1893, and that the current building was constructed between 1900 and 1908. The 1893 Sanborn map lists the small building's use as "Billiards", and in 1900, it is listed as "Vacant." On the 1908 map this building's use is listed as "Drugs." Multiple shed-roofed additions to the east (rear) elevation predate circa 1950. The building has undergone alterations to the facade, as businesses have changed, in recent decades.

This building is located at the southeast corner of Main and Spruce Streets, in the heart of downtown Louisville. The city administration building is across Main Street to the west.

35. Historical Background

Louisville's Sanborn maps reveal that the original building on this lot was a small structure built prior to 1893. Carolyn Conarroe, in *The Louisville Story* (p. 41), provides documentation that the building's earliest use was as a one-room school. This would probably have been before the Louisville School was built at the corner of Spruce Street and Jefferson Avenue in 1880. In 1893, the small building here was a billiards hall, and in 1900, it was vacant. By 1908, a new, much larger, commercial building had been erected here. Its use on the 1908 Sanborn map is listed as "Drugs." From the 1910s, into the late 1930s, this business was known as the Louisville Drug Company. F.J. Kulick was the drugstore's proprietor in 1916, but by 1921, William Korbel was in charge of the business. From circa 1928 through the late 1930s, Benjamin Newrock was the owner and proprietor of the Louisville Drug Company. Freda Newrock, Benjamin's wife, was a teacher.

From circa 1950 to the present, the property has been owned by the Mangus family. In about 1950, T.W. LaSalle's furniture store was located here, and in 1959, Arthur Porta ran dry goods business at this location. In the late 1960s and early 1970s, the Louisville (self serve) Laundromat was located here, and by 1975, this business had evolved into the Peacock Cleaners and Laundromat. From circa 1980 to the present, this building has been a restaurant. Johnny's Restaurant was here in the early 1980s. The Double Happy Chinese Restaurant has been in business here from the mid-1980s to the present.

42. Statement of Significance

This building is historically significant, relative to National Register Criterion A, for its association with early sustained commercial development in Louisville, in support of the area's coal mining industry. The building is architecturally significant as a representative early twentieth century commercial building. The building's significance in these regards is probably not to the extent that would qualify it for individual listing in the National Register of Historic Places, however, it is eligible as a contributing resource within a potential downtown Louisville Historic District.

43. Assessment of historic physical integrity related to significance:

Although this building has undergone changes to its facade, and exterior wall surfaces, it has not had any additions within the past fifty years. It is unreasonable to expect the facades of commercial buildings to remain the same as new businesses come and go. For this reason a greater latitude in assessing integrity should be applied.




