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21. General Architectural Description

The Wildwood Music Building is a one-story L-shaped commercial building located at the northeast corner of Main and Spruce Streets in downtown Louisville. The building presently houses three businesses: Wildwood Music at 804 Main Street, Exquisite Enterprises Inc. at 800 Main Street, and Beebo's Used Books at 925 Spruce Street. The building is of brick and concrete block construction, and its primary elevations (fronting onto Main and Spruce Streets) have been cladded with vertical particle board siding. The building's rear (east) elevation is partially covered with particle board siding, with exposed concrete block on the remainder of the elevation. The building is covered by a flat roof. Parapet walls extending above the roof line on the west and south elevations, are cladded with square-cut wood shingles. The building's west elevation, which fronts to Main Street, has two single-light and one 2-light fixed-pane storefront windows, with wood frames. Two entry doors on this access to Wildwood Music and to elevation provide Exquisite Enterprises Inc. Two signs on the west elevation advertise "Wildwood Music", and "Exquisite Enterprises Inc. Awards, Plaques, Trophys, Engraving." A woodpaneled door on the building's south elevation enters Beebo's Used Books at 925 Spruce Street. Secondary entrances are located at the east end of the south elevation, and on the east (rear) elevation.

29.Construction History (include description and dates of major additions, alterations, or demolitions:

Sanborn insurance maps provide evidence that the south end of this building was constructed sometime before 1893, while the north end was built between 1908 and 1916. Boulder County Assessor records indicate that major renovations of the building were carried out in 1952 and 1975.

35. Historical Background

Sanborn insurance maps indicate that the south half of this building was built prior to 1893, and that for many years it housed a general store. From 1916 (and perhaps several years earlier), until the early 1960s, a clothing business known as the Hub Store was located here. Frank A. Mangus was the manager of the Hub Store in the 1910s and 1920s. By 1930, the Hub Store had been taken over by O.C. Anderson and George A. Webster. This business later became known as Webster's Hub Store, and operated here into the 1960s. The current retail tenant at 800 Main Street, Exquisite Enterprises Inc., has been here since 1966.

This building is best known, though, as the location of the First Bank of Louisville. Also known as the Louisville Bank, and as the First State Bank, this institution was in business at what is now 804 Main Street from shortly after the turn of the twentieth century, until the 1950s. Some of the bank's officials over the years included L.E. Chenault, J.R. Thirlaway, J.E. Park, W.L. Armstrong, Roy N. Austin, W.L. Tanner, H.H. Hoyt, Lawton W. McCorkle, and G. Russell Henning. Henning, a bank president who was also a mortician, served as Mayor of Louisville from 1926 to 1930. After the bank closed in the 1950s, this part of the building was used by the Public Service Company of Colorado until circa 1990. Wildwood Music, specializing in the sale of guitars, opened in this part of the building at 804 Main Street, in the early 1990s.

The north half of this building was built within a few years following 1908.

42. Statement of Significance

This building is historically significant, relative to National Register Criterion A, for its association with early sustained commercial development in downtown Louisville. Due to a lack of integrity, though, the building should be considered ineligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places, and as a non-contributing property within a potential downtown Louisville historic district.

43. Assessment of historic physical integrity related to significance:

This building's historical integrity has been compromised by particle board siding put up on the west and south elevations, and by the wood shingles applied to the parapet walls, also on the west and south elevations. The building's windows and doors have also been altered. In its present condition, the building is no longer able to convey a sense of its historic significance.




