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### 21. General Architectural Description

This property is comprised of a one-story, wood frame building, located at the southeast corner of LaFarge Avenue. and Spruce Street. The west part of the building was historically a residence, while the east part of the building housed the offices of the Louisville Times for several years. The building is now a duplex. Oriented toward Spruce Street to the north, the building is supported by a low concrete foundation. The exterior walls have been cladded with horizontal vinyl siding, and the intersecting gables roof has grey asphalt shingles and boxed eaves. There are no chimneys. Three windows on the facade - a single-light fixed-pane, and two lxl horizontal sliders - are not historic, having replaced the original 1/1 double-hung sash windows here. Windows elsewhere on the building are primarily 1/1 double-hung sash and 3/1 double-hung sash, with painted white wood frames and surrounds, and with aluminum screens. Two wood-paneled entry doors, with aluminum storm doors, enter into the building's two residences, on the north elevation (facade). A secondary entrance is located on the south elevation, where a painted white wood-paneled door, with an aluminum storm door, opens onto a small concrete porch.

29.Construction History (include description and dates of major additions, alterations, or demolitions:

Boulder County Assessor records list 1920 as this building's date of construction. Sanborn insurance maps, dated 1893, 1900, and 1908, show that, during those years, a dwelling was located here at the southeast corner of LaFarge and Spruce. This appears to be an earlier structure than the extant one, however. There have been no additions to the building within the past fifty years.

This property is located at the southeast corner of LaFarge Avenue and Spruce Street in a residential neighborhood, a block to the west of downtown Louisville.

### 35. Historical Background

Boulder County Assessor records indicate that this building was constructed in 1920. By the mid-1930s, this was the residence of W. Scott and Harriet N. Withers. The Withers lived in the part of the building that is now 800 Spruce Street, and they published the *Louisville Times* newspaper in the part of the building that is now 804 Spruce Street. The *Louisville Times* had begun publication in 1913, and in the late 1920s, it was being published out of a garage at 48 Front Street by Mrs. Pearl Conley. Mrs. Conley lived nearby at 111 Pine Street.

The Withers published the newspaper here at 800/804 Spruce Street through most of the 1940s. In about 1950, they sold the property to Albert and Elizabeth Varra. By 1951, Arthur R. and Della Hobson were living here, and they had become the new publishers of the *Louisville Times*. The Hobsons apparently leased the property from the Varras. By 1959, the Hobsons had moved to a house on Johnson Avenue, but they were still publishing the newspaper here. By the mid-1960s, this building had been given over entirely to residential use. Although it has two addresses - 800 and 804 Walnut - it appears to have served as a single dwelling, rather than as a duplex, for most of the past thirty-five years.
