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21. General Architectural Description

Constructed in 1946, this building is one of the newest commercial building's located along Louisville's Main Street. The building fronts onto a wide concrete sidewalk, which parallels Main Street to the west, and it is located between the Colacci's Restaurant building to the north, and the Wildwood Music Building to the south. The building's facade is of brick masonry construction, covered with white stucco. The front part of the building is covered by an intersecting gables roof, with red clay tiles, and with closed eaves. An enclosed, rounded entryway is set within a small courtyard, set back from the sidewalk along Main Street. A glass-in-steel-frame entry door opens onto the courtyard, and a teal color canvas awning, with black wrought iron supports, extends out to the main sidewalk. The courtyard is partially enclosed by low half-walls, flanked by pillars, adorned with Vietnamese characters. Windows on the facade include a large single-light fixed-pane window, and four slender, vertically-oriented singlelight fixed-pane windows, covered by teal color canvas awnings. An octagon-shaped neon sign on the facade wall advertises "Vietnamese & Chinese Restaurant", and is adorned with Chinese symbols. The sign was drawn by owner Tulien Loitrinh' father and has special meanings commemorating their family's heritage. Another vertically-oriented sign at the north end of the facade advertises TULIEN'S.

The rear portion of this building, to the east, has a flat roof, and was probably once part of an earlier structure here, predating the front part of the building's 1946 construction. At least part of this part of the building appear to be of brick construction, and there is a red brick chimney is located on the exterior of the north elevation.

29.Construction History (include description and dates of major additions, alterations, or demolitions:

This building was constructed in 1946. There have been no additions subsequent to the original construction. Sanborn insurance maps show that an earlier building here was constructed prior to 1893. The rear portion of the extant structure (the front part of the extant structure was built in 1946) may also have been part of the earlier building.

Tulien's Vietnamese and Chinese Restaurant is located on the east side of Main Street, in downtown Louisville. An asphalt parking lot behind the building, extends to the alley.

35. Historical Background

Sanborn insurance maps reveal that this lot was first built on prior to 1893, and that during the period from 1893 to 1908, a general store was located here. In the 1930s, the property was owned by Rome Perella, but by the mid-1940s, the property had been acquired by William F. Clements of Denver. In 1946, Clements had the present building constructed to house what he envisioned as a "swank restaurant specializing in fried chicken." Clements had previously operated the American Lunch and Bar, located at 1709 Curtis Street in downtown Denver. Clement's efforts to obtain a liquor license for his Louisville restaurant was met with great resistance from several of the community's citizens. They presented a petition to the State Liquor Board, arguing that with six taverns and three package goods store, Louisville did not need another liquor establishment. The business did eventually open, however, and was initially called the Hacienda Restaurant. In the 1950s and early 1960s, the Hacienda was owned by Phillip Panetta of Denver. By 1966, the business' name had been changed to Luigi's Restaurant. Luigi's, which was owned by the Colacci family of Louisville, was located here until the mid-1980s. The restaurant was known as the Parrot II Restaurant in the late 1980s and early 1990s, followed briefly by Beverly's Restaurant in the early 1990s.

Tulien's Restaurant has been here since 1994. Tulien Loitrinh, the restaurant's owner, is of Chinese heritage. She was born in Vietnam in 1958 after her parents had left China in the 1940s in the midst of the Communist takeover. Tulien came to the United States with her husband, Tan Loi, and her brother, The Trinh, in 1979. They were sponsored by Tulien's uncle who had been living in Colorado. Tulien worked at Storage Technology for twelve years prior to opening up the restaurant in 1994. She and her husband have two children.

This building is historically significant, relative to National Register Criterion A, for its association with commercial development in downtown Louisville. The building is particularly important because it has housed one of several restaurants that have become an important part of downtown Louisville's commercial fabric. The building is architecturally significant, under National Register Criterion C, because it is downtown Louisville's only example of a Mediterranean Revival style building. Tulien's Restaurant should be considered individually eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places, as well as a contributing property within a potential downtown Louisville historic district.




