

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21. General Architectural Description

Supported by a concrete foundation, this modest house features painted white wide horizontal wood siding exterior walls, over wood frame construction. Non-original sandstone facing appears on the lower wall surface, and around the entryway, on the facade (east elevation). The house is covered by a side gabled roof, with green asphalt shingles and closed eaves. There are no chimneys. Original windows are single or paired 1/1 double-hung sash, with painted white wood frames and painted green wood surrounds, and with exterior metal storm windows. Two non-original singlelight fixed-pane windows are located on the building's east elevation (facade). A painted white wood-paneled door, with three stepped lights, and with a silver metal storm door, is set within a recessed gabled entryway, on the facade. Located on the west elevation, the house's rear entrance features a painted white woodpaneled door which opens onto a concrete patio. The patio is covered by a fiberglass roof, with black wrought iron supports. A 6' by 6' gabled addition to the west (rear) elevation predates circa 1950, or may in fact be part of the original construction.

Construction History (include description and dates of major additions, alterations, or demolitions:

Boulder County Assessor records list 1900 as this house's date of construction, although it was undoubtedly built much later, probably in the early 1930s. A Boulder County property appraisal card for the property, dated circa 19650, includes a photograph and building diagram. These document that there have been no additions to the building within the past forty years. A 6' by 6' gabled extension to the west (rear) elevation may be part of the original construction. In more recent times, the lower facade wall, and the front entryway, were faced with sandstone.

Comprised of a single house, this property is located at the northwest corner of Front and Walnut Streets, east of downtown Louisville. A small planted grass front yard to the east of the house is dominated by a large fir or spruce tree. Small back and side yards, to the west and south of the house, feature minimal landscaping.

Historical Background

Lot 6 of Block 1 of the Original Town of Louisville, where this house is located, was originally developed during the period 1878 to 1893. After the Original Town of Louisville was platted in 1878, this property at the intersection of Front and Walnut Streets was likely among the first lots developed. Sanborn insurance maps dated 1893 and 1900 show that in those years a dwelling was located at the front of the lot, with two smaller dwellings on the alley to the west. By 1908, these buildings were gone, replaced by a new larger dwelling which faced directly onto Front Street to the east.

The property's current residence was probably built in the early-to-mid-1930s. Boulder County Directories, and later Longmont City Directories list several owners and residents here over the years. In the late 1930s and early 1940s, Romaldo Razo, a miner, and his wife Carmen, lived and owned here. The Razos were followed by another mining family, Charles and Sylvia Davis. Residents in the 1950s included Joseph and Ruth Machuga, G.D. Nevills, and Ellis W. and Nina Mae Paull. From circa 1966 to the late 1970s, Forrest A. Tyler owned and lived here. John Janetos was the owner here in 1980, and a few years later this was the Byrd Funeral Home. The property is presently a rental.




