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21. General Architectural Description

The Louisville Times Building is a modest, rectangularshaped, wood-frame structure, which is located on the west side of Main Street, near the north end of downtown Louisville. The building is set back a short distance from a wide concrete sidewalk which parallels Main Street to the east. A large planted grass lawn, to the north of this building, extends to South Street. The building presently has two professional office tenants: the Louisville Times newspaper, and Ledger Services Taxes and Accounting. The building is supported by a low concrete foundation, and exterior walls are painted beige horizontal weatherboard, with painted white 1" by 4" corner boards. The roof is a moderately-pitched front gable, with grey asphalt shingles and boxed eaves. There are no chimneys. The facade, located on the east elevation, is asymmetrically arranged. A painted white and purple wood door, with Xbracing, and with one upper sash light, opens onto a nonoriginal 4-step wood porch, flanked by black wrought iron railings. (Although located on the facade, this door faces south.) Also on the facade, there are two large single-light fixed-pane storefront windows, with painted purple wood frames, and painted white wood surrounds. One of these windows - to the west of the entry - projects slightly from the wall surface, and is covered by a shed hood. A secondary entrance is located on the west (rear) elevation, where a single painted white solid wood door opens onto a concrete stoop.

29.Construction History (include description and dates of major additions, alterations, or demolitions:

Boulder County Assessor records list the year 1900 as this building's date of construction. This date is at least generally plausible, given the building's architectural character and appearance. Sanborn insurance maps are not available for this lot. Boulder County Assessor records also list 1980 as a year built, suggesting that some renovation work was carried out at that time.

The Louisville Times Building is located on the west side of Main Street, near the north end of downtown Louisville. A gravel parking lot behind the building extends to the alley to the west.

Historical Background

Boulder County Assessor records indicate that this building was constructed at the turn of the twentieth century. Efforts to trace its early history, primarily through Boulder County directories, were generally unsuccessful. The building evidently served as a single-family dwelling until the mid-1970s. In 1940, this was the residence of William Kock. He was followed, in the 1950s, by Henry J. and Josephine F. Vehnke. Henry, who worked as a plasterer, passed away in the 1950s, but Josephine lived here into the early 1960s. During the late 1960s and early 1970s, Dennis H. Harmon owned and lived here. In about 1974, the building was converted to commercial use. Lowe Alpine Systems, a distributer of mountain climbing equipment, was the tenant in 1975. In 1980, Huntsmith Sporting Goods was located here, and by 1986, this business had evolved into Colorado Gunsmithing and Sporting Goods. In 1990, Studio Interiors Pro Upholstery was in business at this location. In 1997, Ledger Services Inc. and Data Link Systems were both in business here. The two present tenants (in 2000) are the Louisville Times newspaper, and Ledger Services Taxes and Accounting. The Louisville Times has had its offices in several locations over the years. It began publication in 1913.

This building is historically significant, relative to National Register Criterion A, for its association with residential growth in Louisville during the first half of the twentieth century. The building is architecturally significant as a representative wood-frame front gabled dwelling. The building's significance in these regards is not to the extent that would qualify it for individual listing in the National Register of Historic Places. It is, however, eligible as a contributing property within a potential downtown Louisville Historic District.




