21. General Architectural Description

This $1\frac{1}{2}$ -story wood-frame house is situated on a large lot, on the west side of Main Street, north of downtown Louisville. The building is supported by a painted blue low concrete foundation, and its exterior walls are narrow, painted blue, horizontal wood siding, with painted white l" by 4" corner boards. The roof is a moderately-pitched side gable, with grey asphalt shingles and boxed eaves. There are three red brick chimneys - one located on the ridge, and the other two located on the roofs of additions to the west (rear) elevation. One of these chimneys has a distinctive corbelled cap. A gabled wall dormer is located on the facade. A canted hipped-roof bay window, with three 1/1 double-hung sash windows, is located on the south elevation. The building's other windows are predominantly 1/1 double-hung sash, with painted red wood frames, and painted white wood surrounds, and with wood cornices. Windows on the additions to the west are singlelight fixed-panes, or casement type windows. The house's facade fronts toward Main Street on the east elevation. A distinctive painted white wood-paneled entry door, here, has one upper sash light, a projecting sawtooth top rail, a projecting locking rail, and carved panels. This door opens onto a 4-step tongue-and-groove wood porch, which extends nearly the full length of the facade. Painted blue wood-frame half-walls, and painted red and white turned columns and engaged columns, support a flat porch roof. The porch roof and columns are decorated with a frieze, and with scrolled brackets. The porch roof also serves as a second story balcony. The balcony features an open painted white wood balustrade, with turned balusters. A stained natural brown glassin-wood-frame door opens onto the balcony from the upper half story, where the dormer is located. A secondary entrance is located at the west end of the south elevation, where a painted blue and white wood-paneled door opens onto a concrete stoop.

A **Storage Shed** is located in the backyard, west of the house along the south property line. This is a one-story wood-frame building, supported by a wood timbers on grade foundation. It has vertical wood plank walls, and a shed roof, with rolled asphalt roofing, over 1x wood decking and 2x wood rafters. Paired woodpaneled doors are located on the north elevation.

29.Construction History (include description and dates of major additions, alterations, or demolitions:

Boulder County Assessor records list 1908 as this building's date of construction. The original $1\frac{1}{2}$ -story side-gabled house measured 24' N-S by 16' E-W. Two single-story additions to the west (rear) elevation, predate 1948. One of these additions, with a gable and shed roof, measures 24' N-S by 14' E-W; the other addition, with a shed roof, measures 12' N-S by 10' E-W.

35. Historical Background

This house was built in 1908, and has served as a single family residence since that time. Boulder County directories indicate that by 1920, this was the home of Joseph and Carmela DeSalvo. Like many men of his generation in Louisville, Mr. DeSalvo worked as a coal miner. The DeSalvos, who had come to Louisville sometime between 1904 and 1916, lived in this house into the late 1950s. Other members of the DeSalvo family who lived here over the years included William (also a miner), Jennie, Mary, and Joseph Jr.

In the early 1960s, the property was sold by the DeSalvos to Victor and Josephine Petrelli. The Petrellis also owned property across the street at 1016 Main Street. From the 1970s to the present (2000) this property has apparently been used as a rental, and has had several tenants. Nancy E. & John D. Pavelich, the current owners, have held the property since June of 1996.

42. Statement of Significance

This house is historically significant, relative to National Register Criterion A, for its associations with the DeSalvo family, and with residential development in Louisville during the first half of the twentieth century. The property is also historically significant for its representation of this Louisville neighborhood's ethnic Italian heritage. The building is architecturally significant because it is one of the community's best examples of a wood frame side gabled dwelling, dating from the early 1900s. For these reasons, this property is eligible for individual listing in the National Register of Historic Places under Criteria A and C.

43. Assessment of historic physical integrity related to significance:

This property exhibits a high level of historic integrity. Two additions to the rear elevation are more than fifty years old, and are architecturally compatible with the building's original construction.

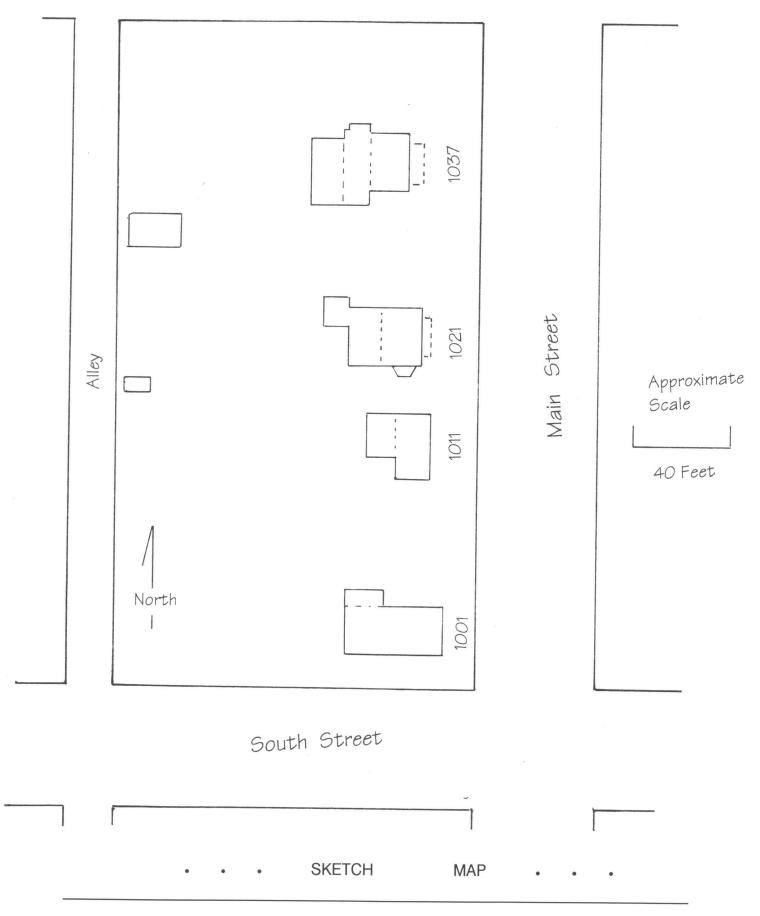

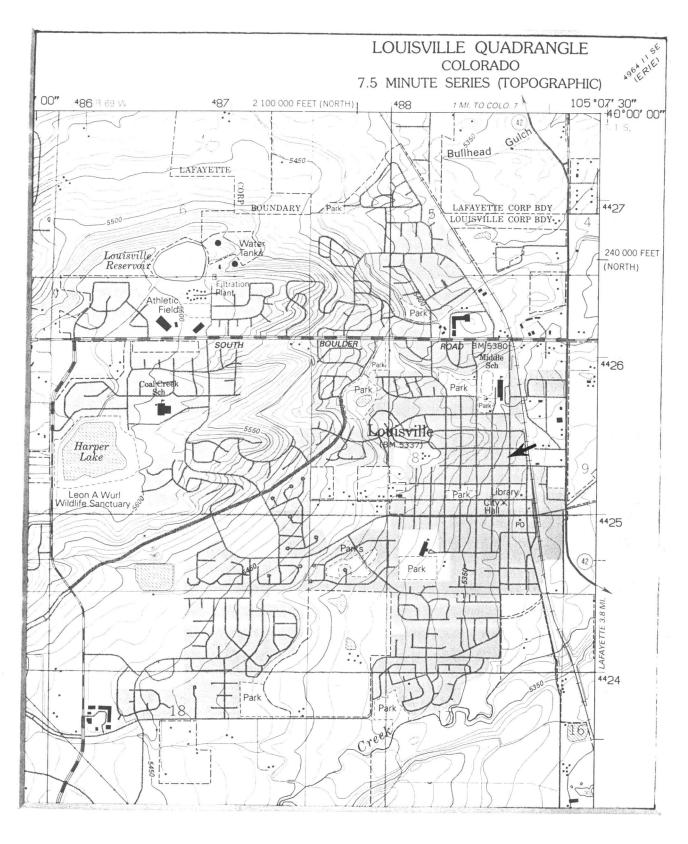
