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#### 21. General Architectural Description

This property is located on the east side of Main Street, to the north of downtown Louisville. It is comprised of a house, along with a garage, a chicken house and a storage shed. Featuring a rectangular plan, the house is a one-story, wood-frame, dwelling, built in the Bungalow style. It is supported by a low concrete foundation, the exterior walls are painted yellow stucco, and the roof is a moderately-pitched clipped front gable. The roof has brown asphalt shingles, and exposed rafter ends. A red brick chimney is located on the ridge. Windows are entirely single and paired 3/1 double-hung sash (ribbon style), with painted white wood frames and surrounds. A stained natural brown solid wood door, with three upper sash lights, and with an aluminum storm door, opens onto a concrete porch located on the west elevation (facade). The porch is covered by a clipped gable hood, supported by painted white tapered squared posts. A painted white wood-paneled door, with an aluminum screen door, leads into an enclosed rear porch, on the building's east (rear) elevation.

The **Garage** is located near the alley, at the southeast corner of the lot. This is a one-story, wood-frame structure, supported by a low concrete perimeter walls foundation. The garage's walls and gabled roof are cladded with corrugated metal. There are no windows. A set of paired, wood and corrugated metal garage doors open toward the alley on the building's east elevation.

The **Chicken House** is located near the alley, at the northeast corner of the lot. This is a wood-frame structure, with wood timbers on grade as its foundation, and with unpainted horizontal wood plank walls. Some of the exterior walls have been covered with tin, and the shed roof is covered with rolled asphalt over 1x wood decking and 2x wood rafters. A band of three screened window openings is located along the east end of the south elevation. Two vertical wood plank doors, are located to the west end of the south elevation. Built onto the west end of this building is a small wood fame and corrugated metal shed, which appears traditionally to have been used as a tool shed.

The **Storage Shed** is located just three feet west of the garage. This is a small wood frame structure with a wood timbers on grade foundation, and with corrugated metal exterior walls. It has a shed roof, with corrugated metal over 1x wood decking and 2x wood rafters. There are no windows. An unpainted vertical wood plank door, side hinged with metal strap hinges, is located on the west elevation.

Boulder County Assessor records indicate that this house was constructed in 1910. There have been no additions, and no noticeable exterior alterations, subsequent to the original construction.

#### **Historical Background**

This house was constructed circa 1910, and has served as a single family dwelling since that time. In the late 1920s, this was the residence of Andrew L. and Martha Wing. Andrew was a coal miner. By the mid-1930s, this house had become the residence of another Louisville coal miner, Nicola (Nick) Delpizzo, and his wife Anna (Annie). Born in Italy, Mr. Delpizzo immigrated to America, and came to Louisville to work in the coal mines, at age nineteen. The Delpizzos owned and lived here into the early 1990s. After he retired from mining, Nick was an avid gardner. A 1991 Boulder Daily Camera newspaper article noted that at that time Mr. Delpizzo was the last known survivor of the 1939 Monarch Mine disaster which killed eight men.

#### 42. Statement of Significance

This house is historically significant, relative to National Register Criterion A, for its associations with the Delpizzo family, and with Louisville's residential development during the first half of the twentieth century. The property is also historically significant for its representation of this Louisville neighborhood's ethnic Italian heritage. The building is architecturally significant for its Bungalow style of architecture. For these reasons, this property is eligible for individual listing in the National Register of Historic Places. The garage, chicken house, and shed all date from the period of significance, and they do contribute to the property's historic setting, and sense of time and place.

#### 43. Assessment of historic physical integrity related to significance:

This property exhibits an extremely high level of historic integrity. There have been no additions and no alterations to the exterior of the house. The three secondary structures all date from the period of significance, and no modern structures have been built on the lot.

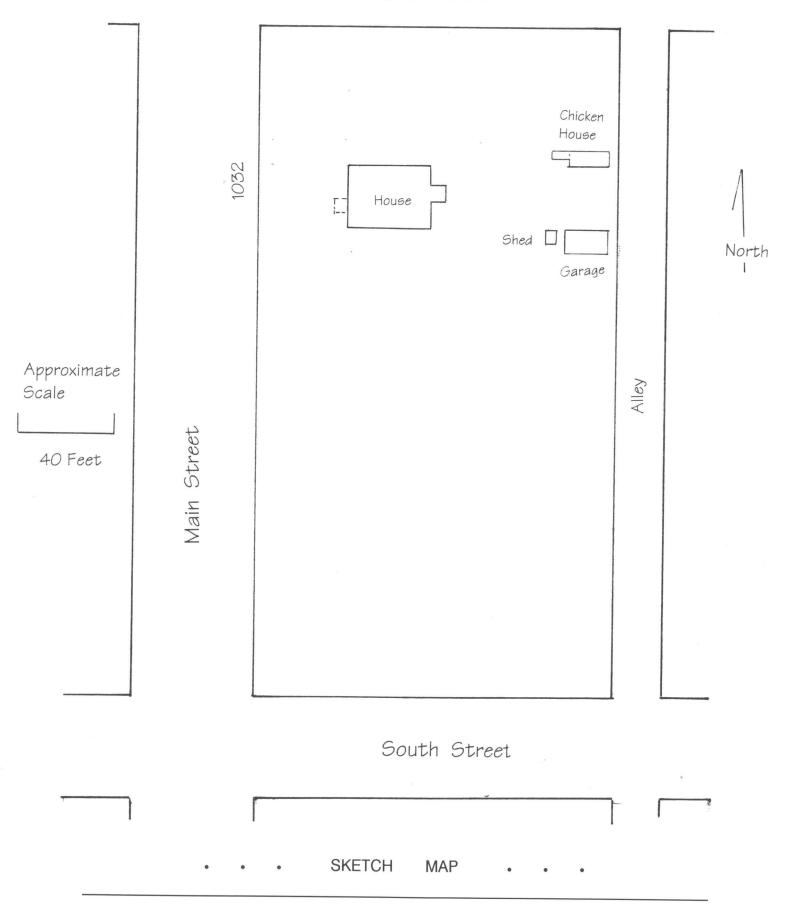

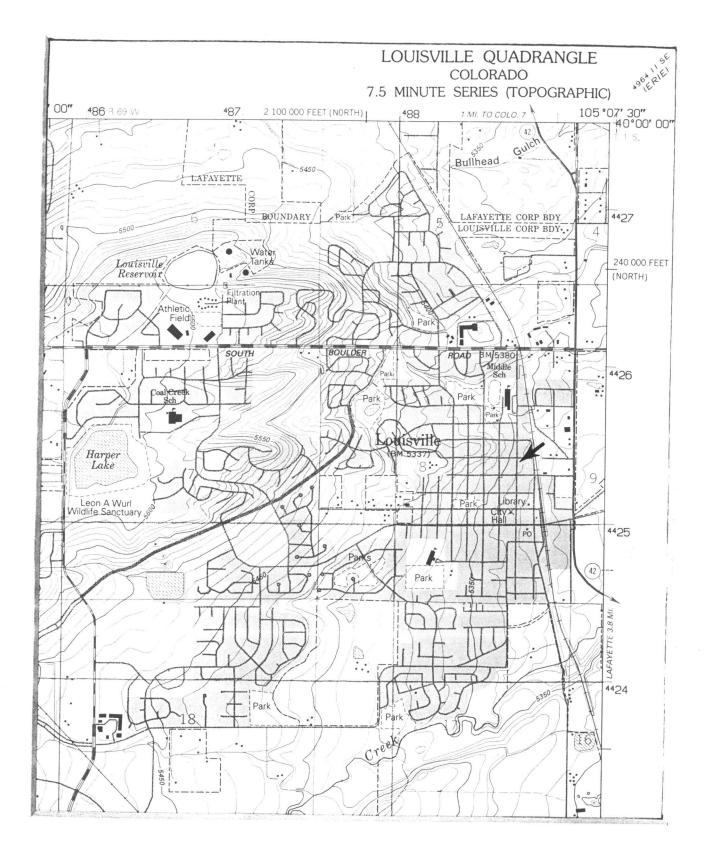
