13. Boundary Description and Justification: The surveyed area is bounded by Jefferson Avenue on the west, Walnut Street on the north, an alley on the east, and a property line on the south.

- 21. General architectural description: 836 Jefferson is a one-story house of brick construction, rectangular in plan, with its primary façade facing west to Jefferson Avenue. The foundation is concrete and the first floor is set high above the sloping grade to accommodate basement window wells on the north and south sides. The exterior is red brick. The roof is hipped, covered with dark brown asphalt shingles. All eaves are boxed and covered with white aluminum soffit material. The front entrance is centered on the west façade, with a tall concrete stoop, a concrete step, and a projecting hipped porch roof on two wrought iron posts. The front door is white paneled, probably metal, with a black metal security door. Windows are white aluminum sash, mostly sliders with some single-hung. The front façade has a large window flanked by sliders at the north end, and a bank of four long, narrow windows set high in the wall at the south end. The north and south elevations each have two basement window wells. The south face of the roof has a large roof-mounted evaporative cooler.

- 23. Landscaping or special setting features: Jefferson Place Subdivision is a historic residential neighborhood adjacent to downtown Louisville. The subdivision is laid out on a standard urban grid of narrow, deep lots with rear alleys. Houses are built to a fairly consistent setback line along the streets with small front lawns, deep rear yards and mature landscaping. Small, carefully maintained single-family residences predominate. Most of the houses are wood framed, one or one and one-half stories in height, featuring white or light-colored horizontal wood or steel siding, gabled or hipped asphalt shingled roofs and front porches. While many of the houses have been modified over the years, most of the historic character-defining features have been preserved. 836 Jefferson Avenue is of more recent construction and differs from historic Jefferson Place houses in its contemporary style, brick material and dark color, but it does retain the small, one-story scale of the historic houses. Newer, more contemporary houses are more common in the northwest corner of Jefferson Place (800 and 900 blocks Jefferson) than elsewhere in the subdivision. The 836 Jefferson property consists of a corner lot with Walnut Street to the north and Jefferson Avenue to the west. Front, side and rear yards are unfenced and feature simple grass lawns with gravel adjacent to the house. Two very large trees flank a concrete walk that leads from Jefferson Avenue to the tall front concrete stoop. The grade slopes down to the south to a wooden railroad tie retaining wall along the south property line. At the back of the house, the grade slopes down to the east. The back door on the east side of the house leads to a raised concrete stoop with 5 concrete steps leading north to a concrete walk to Walnut, and 5 concrete steps leading east to a small storage shed. The eastern portion of the lot contains a large detached garage with a wide concrete driveway that leads north to Walnut Street.

Associated buildings, features, or objects: At the east end of the property, there is a large garage with horizontal composition siding painted white, a gabled roof with dark brown asphalt shingles, a metal panel overhead garage door facing north, a white slider window facing west and a white door with black security door facing west to the back yard. A small storage shed between the house and the garage has white horizontal composition siding, a gabled roof with dark brown asphalt shingles and a metal panel door facing north.

35. Historical background:

This building is located in Jefferson Place, the first residential subdivision in Louisville, but it is of more recent construction. According to Boulder County and City of Louisville building permit records, the existing house at 836 Jefferson was constructed in 1983, following the demolition of the original house that had been constructed in circa 1905. It was during the long eighty-plus years of ownership by the related Andrew/Norman/Harnagel family that the original house was torn down and the current house was constructed.

Isaac and Mary Ann Hearn Robbins and their three children owned and resided in the original house from the early 1900s until 1930. Isaac Robbins worked as a coal miner.

Edward and Ethel Andrew purchased the house in 1930. Edward was killed in a mine accident in 1940 and Ethel remained in the house with their daughter Lucille. Lucille married John Lewis Norman in the early 1950s and soon after, they owned and lived in the house along with Ethel. Ethel Andrew died in 1968. John Norman worked as a machinist at Rocky Flats. In 1983, John and Lucille had the old house demolished and the existing house built.

Lucille Norman died in 2000 and John Norman died in 2004, John Norman's heir, John Harnagel, became the owner of the house. He is the current owner and occupant.

Another address used for 836 Jefferson under Louisville's old address system was 347 Jefferson, and in the 1940 directory, when addresses were in a period of transition, its address was 840 Jefferson.

Discuss: This building is being recorded as part of a 2010-2011 intensive-level historical and architectural survey of Jefferson Place, Louisville's first residential subdivision, platted in 1880. The purpose of the survey is to determine if there is potential for National Register, State Register or local historic districts. Jefferson Place is eligible as a State Register historic district under Criterion A. Ethnic Heritage, European, for its association with European immigrants who first lived here and whose descendants continued to live here for over fifty years. The period of significance for the State Register historic district is 1881 - 1980. Jefferson Place is potentially eligible as a National Register historic district under Criterion A, Ethnic Heritage, European. However it needs data to determine dates of some modifications, and to more definitely establish the significant impacts of various European ethnic groups on the local culture of Louisville. The period of significance of a National Register district is 1881 – 1963. Jefferson Place is eligible as a local Louisville historic district under local Criterion B, Social, as it exemplifies the cultural and social heritage of the community.

European immigrant families flocked to Colorado coal mining communities, including Louisville, in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries in search of economic opportunities they could not find in their own countries. Louisville's Welch Coal Mine, along with other mines in the area, recruited skilled workers from western Europe. In the early years before 1900, most of the miners who lived in Jefferson Place came from English-speaking countries.

Immigrants from England brought a strong tradition and expertise in coal mining. The English are widely credited with developing the techniques of coal mining that were used locally, and they taught these techniques to other miners. The British mining culture was instilled in the early Colorado coal mines. English immigrants also brought expertise in other necessary skills such as blacksmithing and chain forging.

Later Jefferson Place residents arrived from Italy, France, Austria, Germany, Hungary, Slovakia, and Slovenia, among other places. The Italians eventually became the largest single ethnic group in Jefferson Place and in

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Louisville as a whole. About one-third of the houses in Jefferson Place were owned and occupied by Italian immigrants. Italian immigrants left their mark on Louisville in the food and beverage industries. To the present day, downtown Louisville is known throughout the Front Range for its tradition of Italian restaurants. The impacts of the heritage and customs of the other European ethnic groups could be significant, but are not well documented and need further investigation.






836 Jefferson Avenue, Louisville, Colorado
