WATER UPDATE

The City's Public Works Department worked seven days a week from December 30 until mid-February to restore water to all homes in Louisville. Safety continues to be the City's top priority and we are grateful to everyone for their patience during this period as we worked to restore safe drinking water.

The City's water supply meets or exceeds all drinking water standards and has been safe to use/consume since the Boil Water Order was lifted by the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) on January 6.

Around 80 homes in severely fire-impacted areas had their water turned off to isolate those areas from the rest of Louisville's water. After extensive sampling, testing and flushing by the Public Works Department over the course of January and February, water was restored to these homes.

Continued Testing

Although the City's drinking water continues to meet or exceed all regulatory requirements as set by CDPHE and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), the Public Works Department has decided to continue its testing program during the recovery period and make test results available on the interactive map.

If your home is adjacent to a severely fire-affected area and you have vulnerable members of your household, including infants, the elderly, and/or immunocompromised individuals, please feel free to contact the Public Works Department to request individual water testing. This is not mandatory, but the City is offering this free testing to provide peace of mind to residents. To request a test, email MarshallFire@LouisvilleCO.gov or call 720.824.3100.

Firefighting Efforts Lead to Boil Water Order

During the Marshall Fire, Louisville's water system experienced extreme demand from firefighting efforts. Despite the efforts to keep water pressure up for firefighting, the system continued to lose pressure as fire damaged the system. One of the emergency measures taken to restore pressure to the system was to release untreated Marshall Reservoir water into the distribution systems, which led to the Boil Water Order.

To support firefighting efforts, Louisville also connected its system to Superior's water system. Louisville and Superior are no longer connected.

ANNUAL HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE & E-WASTE DROP OFF

In 2021, residents safely disposed of nearly 12,000 pounds of household hazardous waste and recycled 4,500 pounds of e-waste at the annual household hazardous waste and e-waste drop off event!

Once again, the City will be hosting another Household Hazardous and E-Waste Drop Off event this spring. This event is only for Louisville residents and by appointment only. SMOKE DETECTOR RECYCLING

If your home experienced smoke damage, all smoke detectors should be replaced. Old smoke detectors should be recycled properly because they contain a small amount of radioactive material, which should not go to landfill.

Recycling through Household Hazardous Waste is available from Boulder County until March 31. Visit www.BoCo.org/HMMF to make an appointment.

SPRING LEAF & BRANCH CURBSIDE EVENTS

Republic customers can take part in the Spring Curbside Leaf & Branch Collection Events, Republic will collect up to twenty (20) compostable bags and an unlimited number of bundles of shrubbery and tree limbs cut to 4' length, no more than 18" in diameter, and tied with twine or rope. Compostable bags can be purchased at home improvement stores.

The compost is available through the City's contract with Republic Services.

Residents who have recovered sentimental items from burn areas that are damaged from ash, soot, smoke, or water/snow are advised to hold on to these items and not attempt to clean them on their own. Soot and ash are toxic and abrasive. Please refer to FEMA guidelines for safe handling of fire damaged items for your own personal safety and to avoid further damage to salvaged items.

Louisville Historical Museum staff have planned a series of workshops with professional conservators who will help residents learn how to evaluate and care for items they have recovered from the Marshall Fire.

Conservators will discuss safe handling, care, and cleaning of fire-damaged items and be available for Q&A. These workshops are free and open to the public.

The workshops will have multiple stations to provide several services to the community at once. One station will be dedicated to learning how to clean recovered items.

Another station will give residents the opportunity to learn preserving items for the future and scan photos, important documents, and family recipes.

The last station will give residents the space to share their stories about the Marshall Fire with the Museum as a way to document the many experiences of our community during this time for the future.

HONORING THE SUPERIOR HISTORICAL MUSEUM

As two communities that live and work closely together, Louisville and Superior share many things, including an interwoven regional history. The Marshall Fire has brought to light many of the ways our communities are connected and support each other. The Louisville Historical Museum and Superior Historical Museum often share resources, work together, and co-sponsor programs.

The Louisville Historical Museum staff were deeply saddened to hear that the Superior Historical Museum building was lost in the Marshall Fire. The building of the Superior Historical Museum was an original home from the Industrial Mine Camp in Superior that had been moved away after the Industrial Mine closed. The Town of Superior moved it back and interpreted it as an authentic mine camp house and made it the site of the Superior Historical Museum.

Our hearts are with the Town of Superior and Superior Historical Museum volunteers who are feeling the loss of an irreplaceable collection of their town's historic artifacts and their historic museum building. The Louisville Historical Museum staff pledge to help fill in gaps where possible and assist the Superior Historical Commission and museum volunteers in all the ways that we are able.

The Louisville Historical Museum also extends heartfelt condolences to the residents of Superior, Marshall, and Unincorporated Boulder County who lost historic homes and structures.

Davidson Mesa Trail Improvement Project

The Davidson Mesa trail resurfacing project is scheduled to begin as soon as weather permits. The project includes the repair, resurfacing, and replacement of 3.6 miles of existing crusher fine trails on Davidson Mesa Open Space. Trails are being renovated to meet their existing footprint and will include both 10.5' and 8' trails that will accommodate the City's multi-modal use policy and emergency vehicle access. Additionally, the .3 mile section of trail along the north side of the property, overlooking Boulder, which was initially 4' wide, will be officially widened to 8'. City Continues Partnership with Bridge House Ready to Work Program

In 2021, the Parks, Recreation, and Open Space Department was awarded the "Community Service Partner of the Year Award" for their work with Bridge House and their Ready to Work program. Trainees learn job skills, earn and save money, build a rental and work history for one year as a stepping-stone to permanent work and housing. New Cottonwood Park Playground Coming this Spring!

In 2017, the City of Louisville began renovating playgrounds to bring equipment up to date and meet current ADA standards. Cottonwood Park is the fourth play structure to be replaced. In the fall of 2021, City staff conducted public outreach and an online survey to gather input on the theme and equipment at Cottonwood Park. The theme chosen was traditional nature play. The playground will have two separate areas, one for kids 5-12 and the other for kids 2-5. New equipment includes three tall slides, six swings (including an ADA swing and two tot swings), a zip line, a bear on a log, a mermaid water table, a spin cup, and more. Demolition is scheduled to begin in early March, with a completion date of late spring 2022.

VOTER INFORMATION FOR THOSE DISPLACED BY THE MARSHALL FIRE

As long as you plan to return to your address in Louisville, you are eligible to vote.

You will need to update your MAILING address on your voter registration (not your residential address) doing this will ensure you are mailed a ballot for the upcoming Louisville Special Election on April 19, a ballot for the upcoming primary June 28, and ballots for all elections after that until you are able to return to your Louisville home and change your mailing address back.

You can update your voter registration at the Secretary of State website here: GoVoteColorado.gov. Click "Find My Registration" to begin the process.

Please note: If you submitted a permanent change of address with the post office, you may have inadvertently changed your residential address for voting. Do not fret. No need to update again with the post office, simply edit your registration as noted above making your residential address your pre-fire residential home address and provide an alternative mailing address to receive your ballot.

For the April 19 special election anyone who does not get a ballot by mail for any reason can pick up a ballot in person at City Hall (749 Main Street) after March 28 through 7 PM on April 19.
