Spotlight on Housing



Louisville will recover and rebuild, and the City is committed to working with our residents and partners every step of the way. We continue to support and advocate for everyone in Louisville to get our residents home as soon as possible. This month we're focusing on local housing and the challenges we're currently facing.

The loss of 550 homes and businesses in Louisville resulted in many families being displaced. Some were able to find temporary housing in Louisville while others were not as a result of high rental prices, varying insurance limits and other factors.

The loss of these structures has drastically impacted our rental market. Rental prices are rising significantly and it is clear from similar disasters that we're at risk of facing a second wave of residential displacement. Many not directly affected by the fire are finding it difficult to afford to live in the community due to the disaster-induced inflation in housing demand.

In a typical year, rental rates increase 2-5%, year over year. The current rental market does not appear to reflect this trend as the City is hearing reports of rent being raised significantly beyond the typical rate increases. A few factors may be influencing rental rates: First, demand is much greater due to hundreds of individuals entering the market to find temporary housing. Second, many of these people may be able to pay more as they may have higher income than typical renters and are receiving support from their insurance companies to pay higher rents. Lastly, many individuals

may wish to stay in the area and therefore may be willing to pay increased prices to keep their families close to their neighborhood, friends, school, work, etc.

The Colorado Consumer Protection Act (the "Act") prohibits price gouging, which is charging an excessive price for necessities during a disaster period, within the designated disaster area, unless the increased price is directly attributable to additional costs. Price gouging violations are enforced solely by, and at the discretion of, the attorney general or district attorney. The disaster period under the Act for the Marshall Fire began on December 30, 2021, when Governor Jared Polis issued the disaster declaration, and will continue for 180 days until June 28, 2022. Both Governor Polis and Colorado Attorney General Phil Weiser warned property owners against this prohibited practice following the Marshall Fire.

In a typical year, rental rates increase 2-5%, year over year. The current rental market does not appear to reflect this trend as the City is hearing reports of rent being raised significantly beyond the typical rate increases.

RECOVERY NEWS

The last month marked an important milestone in Louisville's road to recovery: Private Property Debris Removal (PPDR) is officially underway! We have numerous crews operating on dozens of sites. The work is being undertaken by contractor DRC, who was awarded the contract for PPDR. The program is a partnership between Louisville, Superior and Boulder County.

The project, which was disrupted by several lawsuits, is projected to take approximately four months to complete for more than 850 properties (in all three jurisdictions) that are taking part in the program. Planning & Building Updates

The Planning and Building Department has already issued hundreds of Debris Removal Permits and over 50 lots have been cleared (while others are underway). We've also received the first rebuilding permit application! The Department is busy preparing for the rebuilding that will soon begin for all properties and will have the resources needed to handle the increased demand. Staff is expediting plan reviews, waiving demolition fees and preparing for the many permit applications we expect to see.

City Repairs Underway

City staff has been focused on repairing City-owned properties and infrastructure that was damaged by the fire. The Operations Team continues to flush waterlines in fire-damaged areas while Parks and Open Space staff manage landscape restoration.

The Davidson Mesa Dog Off-Leash Area (DOLA) reopened on May 6! Staff installed a temporary fence in fire damaged sections to allow the DOLA to reopen until permanent fence construction occurs. Work on the permanent fence is anticipated to begin this summer.

The City also had help cleaning up some properties thanks to volunteers from the community. Open Space and Parks staff have been hosting "Spring Clean Up Events" where volunteers picked up debris and even salvaged some fencing materials. Thanks to everyone who participated!

HYDRANT FLUSHING: MAY - JUNE

Each spring, the City flushes its water mains by opening fire hydrants and allowing them to flow freely for a short period. We do this to maintain the high quality of water in our distribution system. It ensures that adequate water flow is available to firefighters, residents and businesses.

Flushing may result in some temporary discoloration and the presence of sediment in your water. These conditions are not harmful and should be of very short duration. Running your cold water for a few moments should help clear the line. We encourage residents during this time to wash their clothes in the evening hours.



STREET SWEEPING: APRIL - JUNE

During street sweeping, the City uses mechanical streets sweepers to remove debris and litter from streets, weather permitting. Signs will be posted when the sweeper will be coming to your street asking that you move cars off of the street and basketball hoops and other items from the curb.

During the course of the year, please do not pile, rake, sweep or blow anything into the street or gutter. This includes leaves, rocks or other landscape materials.

ASPHALT MILL & PATCHING: APRIL - NOV.

When deterioration is severe, but complete asphalt replacement is not needed, the City's Operations Team mills and patches. The top layer of asphalt is ground down (milled) and cleaned thoroughly to ensure adhesion with the bonding material and patch. In low, cracked or deteriorated areas, asphalt is milled to a level that will integrate the patch with the street. Tack material is applied to create a seamless bond with the patch. REPUBLIC BULK ITEM CURBSIDE PICK UP

Republic Services will collect up to five bulk items curbside from customers during these annual events.

Please have items out by 7:00 A.M. in the street/gutter area. Bulk items are defined as items put out for curbside collection that are not in a container and do not fit in a 32-gallon cart (up to 5 items).

FLOOD MAPPING AND REGULATIONS

The City recently made major investments in drainage infrastructure that have removed floodplain areas from most of Downtown and Oldtown. However, areas along Coal Creek and near drainage channels and irrigation ditches are still prone to flooding. As we head into summer, the City wants to remind everyone about flood safety and how to learn if your property is in the floodplain.

Safety should be the first priority during a flood. Never walk through flowing water or walk through standing water unless you are certain of the depth of the water. Do not drive through flooded areas; more flood victims drown in their cars than anywhere else. If your home has been flooded, shut off the gas and electricity if you are able. The City recognizes that floodplains have natural and beneficial functions if they are preserved and maintained properly. Keeping floodplains open and natural minimizes flood damage by allowing water to spread over a larger area. In some instances, construction in the floodplain cannot be avoided, and the City has a permitting process to address these situations. Any construction on a property in a floodplain must have a floodplain development permit, including minor residential improvements such as a deck. If the improvements you make to your home or commercial building exceed more than 50% of the value of the building, it must be elevated above the base flood elevation as part of the construction.

National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP)

The NFIP makes federally backed flood insurance available for all buildings, whether they are in a designated floodplain or not. Louisville residents are also eligible for a discount on insurance premiums. Renters can also buy flood insurance for their contents. Flood insurance covers direct losses caused by surface flooding, due to either a creek overflowing its banks or a local drainage event. Regular homeowner's insurance does not cover damage caused by floods. Homeowners, realtors, lenders, and insurance agents can obtain copies of floodplain maps and Elevation Certificates, find out if a property is located in a floodplain or obtain floodplain protection advice by visiting City Hall or contacting the Planning Division at 303.335.4592 or planning@louisvilleco.gov. The City also offers site visits to anyone who would like advice from City staff on floodplain issues related to their property. 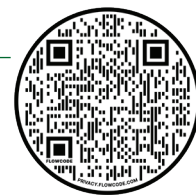

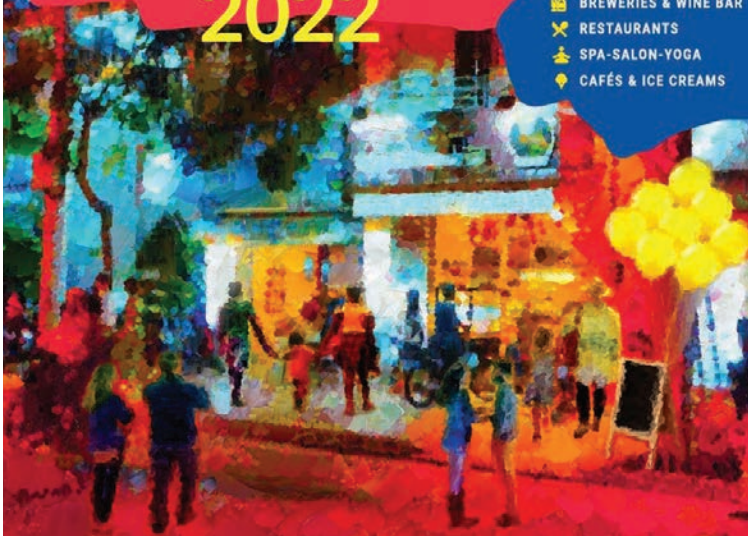

Davidson Mesa Trail Reconstruction Project

The Davidson Mesa Trail Reconstruction Project is underway! This project will repair, resurface, and replace 3.63 miles of crusher fine trails that sustained significant wear and use in the ten years since the City's last resurfacing project on the Mesa. Additionally, the 0.3-mile section of 4-foot wide trail that overlooks Boulder along the north side of the property will be officially widened to 8 feet. During the reconstruction process, temporary closures and trail rerouting will occur with an effort to keep access from the trailhead to the 36 underpass. Welcome Home, Trott-Downer Cabins!

The Trott-Downer Cabins (the "Cabins") were moved to their new location at the southwest corner of Miners Field on Wednesday, March 16 where they are being rehabilitated and then will be interpreted and managed by the Museum. The Museum is excited to share these cabins and their history with you in the future! For now, preservation work continues and they are not open to the public. Keep an eye out for future announcements about the Trott-Downer Cabins!

The Cabins are two small historic cottages that the City of Louisville acquired in order to preserve them and to feature them as a cultural attraction for residents, tourists, and school classes. They were constructed at 801 and 809 Lee Ave. between 1935 and 1940 as part of a complex of several rental cabins. Thanks to the funding from the Historic Preservation Fund, the City moved and stored the Cabins in 2018 and they have now been relocated close to their original location. 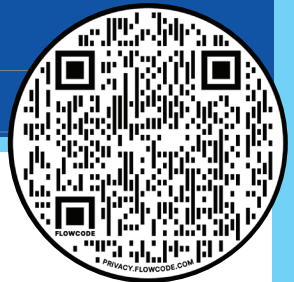
