

A MESSAGE FROM MAYOR STOLZMANN



It's hard to believe it's been a year since the devastation of the Marshall Fire. I know that these next few months will be hard for many of us. For some of us, the holidays may never be the same.

But even as we mark this solemn anniversary, I am filled with hope. I'm so proud of how our community

has come together this past year, and I know that Louisville's future is brighter than ever.

Across the affected areas, families are rebuilding. Crews are hard at work raising new houses and restoring infrastructure. And here at the City, we're taking steps to build resilience and mitigate Louisville's future risk from wildfire and other climate disasters.

We've initiated a wildfire risk assessment for all Cityowned lands, and until that's complete, we've taken short-term steps, including increasing mowing on open space and plans to implement grazing and other fuel reduction efforts in 2023.

We're also working with our state and federal partners on potential grant funding to help us do even more. The City has proposed several projects for FEMA's Hazard Mitigation Grant Program funding, including generators and technology system upgrades for critical City facilities and other improvements to ensure continued water monitoring and access. Together with Boulder County, we're working to develop predetermined evacuation areas for the entire city, as recommended in the Marshall Fire After-Action Report.

However, protecting our community is truly a team effort. As the City works to make structural improvements and mitigate risk on public lands, there are steps homeowners can and should take in order to make their own properties more resilient. You can learn more about strategies to reduce your home's wildfire risk at Boulder County's rebuildingbetter.org site, as well as wildfirepartners.org.

This recovery is a long road, and while we're not there yet, we will get there — together.

RECOVERY NEWS

Ten months after the devastating Marshall Fire, we're continuing to see a strong recovery in Louisville, with rebuild permits approved or in process for more than 150 properties. Assisted by use tax credits and incentives from Xcel Energy, more than half are choosing to rebuild high-performance homes that use less energy and little or no fossil fuel energy.

As our neighbors navigate the rebuilding process, please remember to respect their privacy, both physically and personally. This is a deeply personal journey that everyone manages differently. For everyone's safety, please avoid rebuilding areas as there is a lot of construction equipment and traffic coming and going. Please note, it is illegal to trespass on private property without express permission from the property owner.

We're continuing to learn more about both the fire itself as well as the response — information which is invaluable as we work to make our community better prepared and more resilient against future risk. Recently, the Colorado Division of Fire Prevention and Control released its Facilitated Learning Analysis (FLA), which was requested by Mountain View Fire Department, Louisville Fire Department, and Boulder County in order to gain a deeper understanding of what occurred during the Marshall Fire response. As the one year anniversary of the fire approaches, fire survivors are organizing various events to mark the milestone, including a pet memorial, an event to thank first responders, a solidarity breakfast, a weekend of healing, and more. As survivors hope that these events will provide spaces for the community to process their grief and focus on healing, they have asked that members of the media not attend these events and respect survivors' privacy during this time. The City, along with the Town of Superior and Boulder County, is also working with Mental Health Partners, Community Foundation Boulder County, Jewish Family Service, and other organizations to provide increased access to mental health resources.

The holiday season is normally a joyous time in Louisville, but we know the coming months will be a challenging time for many of us. As a city — as a community — we will continue to be there for one another and to do everything we can to support our neighbors, for as long as necessary, until everyone is home.

WINTERSKATE OUTDOOR ICE SKATING

Now in its 19th season in Louisville, WinterSkate outdoor ice skating at the Steinbaugh Pavilion (824 Front Street) features free parking, traditional holiday music, over 5,000 square feet of ice, concessions, and much more!

WinterSkate is scheduled to run from Friday, November 19, 2022 through Monday, February 20, 2023 (weather permitting). SNOWPLOWING INFORMATION

During winter, the City of Louisville's snow crews are ready to respond 24 hours a day to snow and icy conditions. The crews work hard to keep primary and secondary streets and on-street bike lanes open.

The snowplowing program works on a priority system:

- Priority 1 Major Arterial (for example, high capacity roads like McCaslin Blvd)
- Priority 2 Collectors (for example Washington Street and W Dahlia Street - streets that connect major arterial streets to residential streets)
- **Priority 3** Residential Through Streets (and City parking lots and sidewalks near City rights of way)
- Priority 4 Residential Other (and trails)

SUSTAINABILITY SPOTLIGHT

As the seasons begin to change again, the City's Sustainability staff would like to share a few program updates with the community.

Low-to-No Cost Home Energy Squad Assessments

The weather is getting colder and residents can start their journey towards lower energy bills and a more efficient home by choosing between a no-cost Home Energy Squad visit (normally \$50) or upgrading to a \$50 Home Energy Squad Plus visit (normally \$150). A standard visit includes installation of energy-saving equipment like LED bulbs, energy-efficient showerheads, a programmable thermostat, and faucet aerators. Upgrading to a Plus audit adds:

- Inspection of home exterior, insulation and mechanical systems
- Air leak analysis with a Blower-Door diagnostic test
- Combustion safety test
- Carbon monoxide check
- Infrared imaging and analysis

The City has partnered with an engineering firm and has begun work on an Internal Decarbonization Plan, which includes a strategic roadmap for electrification and decarbonization of all City buildings, fleet and equipment by 2030. The roadmap will be complete in summer 2023.



Sustainable Holiday Ideas

Curbside Composting: We Need Your Help!

Organic materials collected through compost programs are mixed with yard waste and processed to become compost, a nutrient-rich soil amendment. Compost is sold for use in landscaping, road construction, garden projects, and many other soil restoration projects.

In order for organics recycling programs to be sustainable, the compost manufacturers that turn organics into compost must receive organics without contamination and/or non-compostable materials.

The City's compost partner, A1 Organics, has begun rejecting loads of compost if they contain plastics or other non-compostable contaminants. Take a look at the insert included in this newsletter for your curbside composting guidelines to avoid your curbside compost being landfilled.

No Changes to Louisville Disposable Bag Tax in 2023

Did you know the average Louisville resident can save over \$50 per year by bringing their own bags to the store? In January 2023, a disposable bag fee will go into effect statewide, but this change will not affect the Louisville bag tax approved by voters in 2020. Louisville retailers will continue to collect 25¢ for each paper and plastic disposable bag used. Help reduce the use of disposable bags by bringing your own reusable bag. - → Wi-Fi Mobile Hotspots Available for Check Out: A Wi-Fi mobile hotspot is a 4G LTE mobile hotspot device that allows you to connect your mobile-enabled devices (such as laptops, smartphones, tablets, and more) to the Internet. The hotspot is portable and lightweight and can be used anywhere there is T-Mobile coverage. The battery lasts up to 45 hours on standby or up to 6.4 hours during continuous use. Connect up to 16 devices at the same time. These devices are available for a 3-week check out to Louisville and Superior residents with a Louisville Public Library card.

OPEN SPACE & PARKS

Community Park 2022 Improvements

Community Park is one of Louisville's largest and most used parks, and over time some of its infrastructures have exceeded their usable life. In April, City Council approved the Community Park Improvement Project recommended by the Parks and Public Landscaping Advisory Board. Parks staff has worked with contractors to replace the park's irrigation mainline, upgrade the irrigation pump panel, and remove the underutilized BMX pump track. Additionally, the Community Dog Park fence was replaced, and the surface was enhanced for weed mitigation. The final part of the project is the restoration of the irrigation pond to the east of the dog park. This pond is filled with reclaimed water and is no longer used for recreation, including dogs, due to changes in state rules mandating the discontinuation of all recreational uses of reclaimed water in Colorado. The area will be restored and enhanced to include a new walking path, rock seating, and plantings that, once established, will provide a natural area buffer to the dog park and tie into the adjacent open space.

Wildfire Risk Assessment of Louisville Public Lands

This December, the City of Louisville will select a consultant to lead the development of the Wildfire Hazard & Risk Assessment of Louisville Public Lands. This project will identify potential wildfire mitigation opportunities to increase resilience on public lands such as Open Spaces, Parks, Water Treatment Plant grounds, and other City properties. The City's project team is composed of members from multiple City departments and the Fire Department. The project is scheduled to be completed in the summer of 2023. Public engagement meetings will be held as a part of the process. Staff has implemented preventative mitigation activities to reduce fuel loads and ladder fuels on some public lands, including select mowing and trimming or removing fireimpacted vegetation. Trail Improvements

In October, a section of Coal Creek Trail at Dutch Creek (between Augusta Lane and the footbridge) was changed to concrete. This portion of the trail has suffered repeated flooding and extensive damage when Coal Creek overflows its banks. To help prevent future damage, the trail segment has been converted from crusher fines to concrete.

While the creek will continue to flood in this area, concrete is a better-suited material for areas prone to floods or washouts, and will significantly reduce maintenance when flooding does occur. Additionally, the segment of Coal Creek Trail at Aspen Way was replaced with concrete to provide an overall safer user experience.

Update on Tree Health in Fire-Damaged Areas

During the Marshall Fire, hundreds of private and public trees were damaged in the City of Louisville. The trees endured different intensities and duration of heat and suffered with varying degrees of severity. Over the past year, the City Forester has been evaluating affected trees to determine the extent of damage. The evaluation determines if trees are dead or injured and whether there are any safety concerns. Unsafe or dead trees with no signs of recovery are scheduled to be removed by the end of 2022. Some trees are just injured (though they may appear dead) and are being monitored for growth until spring 2023 to decide if they are viable or need to be removed. Staff will plant new trees in late spring to replace trees that have been removed.

COAL CREEK GOLF COURSE

Coal Creek Golf Course Completes Fourth Step in Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary Program

Coal Creek Golf Course is proud to participate in the internationally recognized Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary Program (ACSP) for Golf Courses. ACSP-Golf is an education and certification program developed by Audubon International to help enhance the valuable natural areas and wildlife habitats that golf courses provide, improve efficiency, and minimize the potentially harmful impacts of golf course operations. By implementing and documenting six key environmental management practices, a course earns designation as a Certified Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary. Over the past several years, Coal Creek Golf Course has successfully fulfilled four of the six requirements, including Environmental Assessment, Wildlife and Habitat Management, Water Conservation, and most recently, Chemical Use Reduction and Safety. This included reducing the use of herbicides and insecticides by 80%, reducing the use of fertilizers by 50%, modifying cultural and mechanical practices to reduce pesticide use, and completing required training classes. Receiving certification demonstrates leadership as a steward of the environment and publicly recognizes and rewards environmental achievements.

Human Rights Day

Human Rights Day is observed every year on December 10 — the day the United Nations General Assembly adopted, in 1948, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR). The UDHR is a milestone document, which proclaims the inalienable rights that everyone is entitled to as a human being, regardless of race, color, religion, sex, language, political or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth, or other status. Martin Luther King Jr. Day

Taking place each year on the third Monday in January, the Martin Luther King, Jr., Day of Service is the only federal holiday that is also designated by Congress as a national day of service — a "day on, not a day off." Participation in service activities has grown each year as more Americans are encouraged to provide meaningful change in their communities. Service empowers individuals, strengthens communities, bridges barriers, creates solutions and moves us closer to Dr. King's vision of a beloved community. Source: doi.gov.

Black History Month

Black History Month's first iteration was Negro History Week, created in February 1926 by Carter G. Woodson, known as the "father of Black history." February was chosen by Woodson for the weeklong observance as it coincides with the birthdates of both former U.S. President Abraham Lincoln and social reformer Frederick Douglass. Both men played a significant role in helping to end slavery.

In 1976, President Gerald Ford officially recognized Black History month. In his speech, President Ford urged Americans to "seize the opportunity to honor the toooften neglected accomplishments of Black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history".

In the U.S., the monthlong spotlight during February is an opportunity to engage with Black history, go beyond discussions of racism and slavery, and highlight Black leaders and accomplishments. Source: weforum.org.

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HOLIDAY SAFETY AND CRIME PREVENTION TIPS

At Home

- ✓ Make sure all doors and windows have secondary locks (window pins, deadbolts, etc.) and use them!
- ✓ Don't hide spare keys outside. Give a spare key to a trusted neighbor.
- ✓ Ensure that dark areas and entrances have outdoor lights that are on after dark.
- ✓ Keep trees and shrubbery trimmed so they do not conceal doors and windows. Overgrown foliage can provide a hiding place for criminals.
- Place gifts where they can't be seen from the outside.
- ✓ Be sure to mail cards, checks, or gift certificates from a Post Office or blue USPS collection box.
- ✓ Lock your vehicle and remove all the valuables. Yes, even in your driveway.

While Shopping

- ✓ Park in well-lit areas. Avoid parking by anything that limits the visibility of you or your vehicle.
- ✓ Never leave your vehicle running unattended. Lock your doors immediately after entering or exiting.
- ✓ Avoid carrying large purses and large amounts of cash with you. Carry your purse on your front side and across your body close to you.
- Never leave purses or wallets or any other items of value unattended in your car. If you leave store purchases in your car, lock them in your trunk or keep them in a non-visible area.
- ✓ If your credit card is lost, stolen, or misused, notify your card issuer immediately.

Package Delivery

- ✓ Set up notifications to track your packages. Reschedule or hold deliveries while on vacation.
- Consider insuring your packages and requiring a signature on delivery.
- If you won't be home, consider installing a security camera, asking your neighbors to grab your packages, or having packages delivered to your office.

Leaving for the Holidays

- ✓ Ask a trusted friend or neighbor to watch your home. Make arrangements for mail and newspapers.
- ✓ Use timers for lights and radios while you're away.

After the Holidays

- Don't leave empty boxes advertising expensive toys, electronics, or other gifts outside.
- ✓ Add new items to your home inventory. Take photos or video of all items of value in your home and list each item's make, model, serial number and other information.

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
