Recreation Advisory Board Meeting Minutes

May 22, 2023 Recreation Center 900 West Via Appia 6:30 PM

Call to Order – Chairperson Norgard called the meeting to order at 6:30.

Roll Call was taken and the following members were present:

Approval of Agenda – Kathy Martin asked to move the agenda item about tennis court repair to the first item on the agenda. The agenda and revised agenda order were approved by all members.

Staff Updates

Tennis Court Update – Abby McNeal

Abby McNeal reported that the repairs of the east courts at Centennial Park are 60% done. The work was delayed due to rain. Contractors will continue work on cracks at Pirates Park.

Abby asked for feedback on how to use the remaining money, given that there is not enough money to substantially repair two courts at the Louisville Rec Center, two courts at Centennial Park, and one court at Mission Green. Medium repairs cost \$60,000 to \$80,000 and will last for about two years. Full replacement costs \$150,000+ and will last 8–10 years. The Centennial Park repair would include a new fence.

- RAB members agreed that replacement is a better option when looking at the cost and how long the courts will last after work is completed. Replacement at both Centennial Park and the Rec Center would be ideal.
- The two tennis players on the Board agreed that the courts at Centennial Park should be slated for a full replacement first, due to the degree of current damage.
- One board member expressed astonishment at the cost of the repairs.
 Abby explained that she had a couple of bids, and that another company was too busy to even submit a bid.
- Although Board members did not have information about usage of the court at Mission Green, it is not used by City teaching programs nor by the tennis league. This court is significantly damaged and would require a complete replacement. There is currently not enough money to take care of this court in addition to the needed repairs at the other courts. However, Board members did not want to remove the tennis/pickleball court and replace it with something else, if that means that the City would lose a tennis court with no planned replacement court. The Mission Green court has also been used for pickleball, but the court is very close to houses and there is concern that pickleball may be too noisy.
- The court at Pirates Park is on school district land, so repairs are the best option at that location.
- RAB members would like the City to establish a more robust maintenance budget and repair cycle, so that amenities can be kept in better repair.

Aquatics Update – Paul Borth

Paul Borth, Recreation Supervisor II, and his team presented information about the aquatics program. The aquatics program works to create safe and state-of-the-art facilities and programs for community enjoyment. The aquatics program is currently fully staffed with lifeguards.

- Danny Weinstock, Recreation Supervisor 1, reported that the aquatics team has the qualifications to do all trainings in-house. CPR/AED and Lay First Aid trainings are also provided to the community.
- Daniel Bidleman, Head Lifeguard, said that he trains and mentors new lifeguards. The aquatics program partners with the American Red Cross.
- Nick Pappas, Head Lifeguard, reported that staff try to prevent problems and prepare lifeguards for any eventuality.
- James Vaughan, Pool Maintenance Technician, reported that it is a complex job to clean the pools, replace worn parts, manage the pool chemicals and fix broken parts. It is a challenge to stay within budget.
- There are currently 12 Water Safety Instructors. The group swim lesson programs are popular and fill as soon as registration opens. The aquatics department cannot quickly add more group lessons, because it takes significant time to train new instructors, and there is limited space.
- The lifeguards feel validated by the increase in pay. The Louisville Rec Center is doing a good job of retaining lifeguards.
- Kathy explained the Rec Center has a dedicated funding source, which has renewal and replacement in the budget.

Golf Update – David Baril and David Dean

David Dean announced that new equipment is arriving. The fairway mowers are a quieter and more efficient. The new Robotic mower will mow 15 acres a week and will not require staff to pick up balls before mowing. He will look into purchasing an attached ball picker in the future. The City is deciding the best place to build a new cold storage building, which is needed to store and protect equipment and to store fertilizer.

David Baril reported that Top Tracer was scheduled for promotion and launch on Friday, May 19. Bad weather forced a change of plans, and the launch is now scheduled for May 26. Players have begun to use Top Tracer, and David reports positive feedback. In this introduction period the program is free. Starting on June 1, the cost will be \$10 per day.

Rec Advisory Board members expressed concern that the Golf Clubhouse was not included in the Sustainability Study that has been commissioned by the City Council. The building is inadequate, does not meet sustainability goals, and has aging infrastructure. Board members believe that the City Council should look at all the City buildings, not just focus on a few.

Kathy reported that City Council will meet to discuss Boards and Commissions on June 20.

Board Updates

Rec Center patrons had commented that the upstairs temperature in the Rec Center has sometimes been hotter than desired. Kathy said that this could have been related to the roof work.

The Outdoor Rec Amenities Subcommittee is on hold, awaiting decisions by City Council about possible changes of the Boards and Commissions.

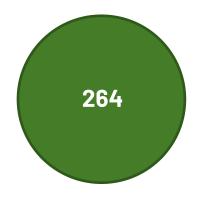

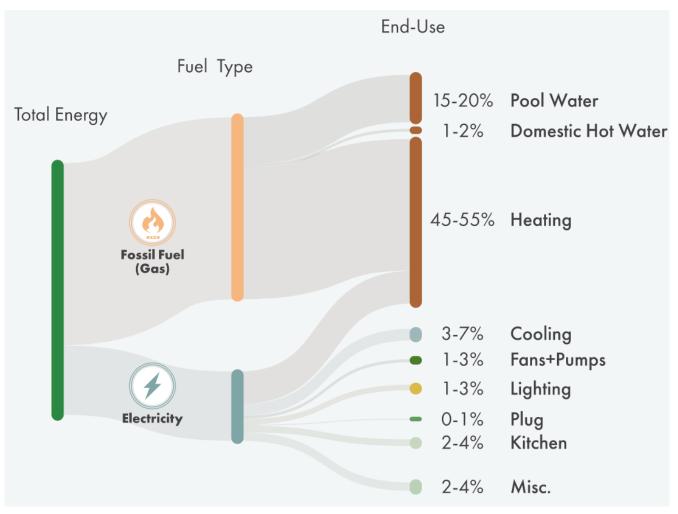
Baseline Performance (EUI-Annual Energy per sf)

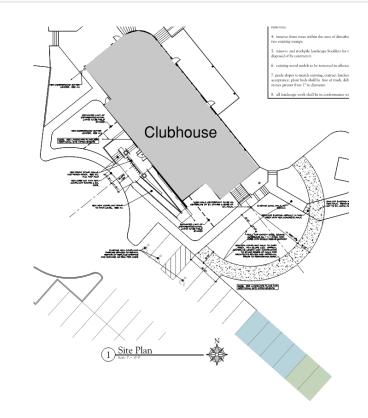

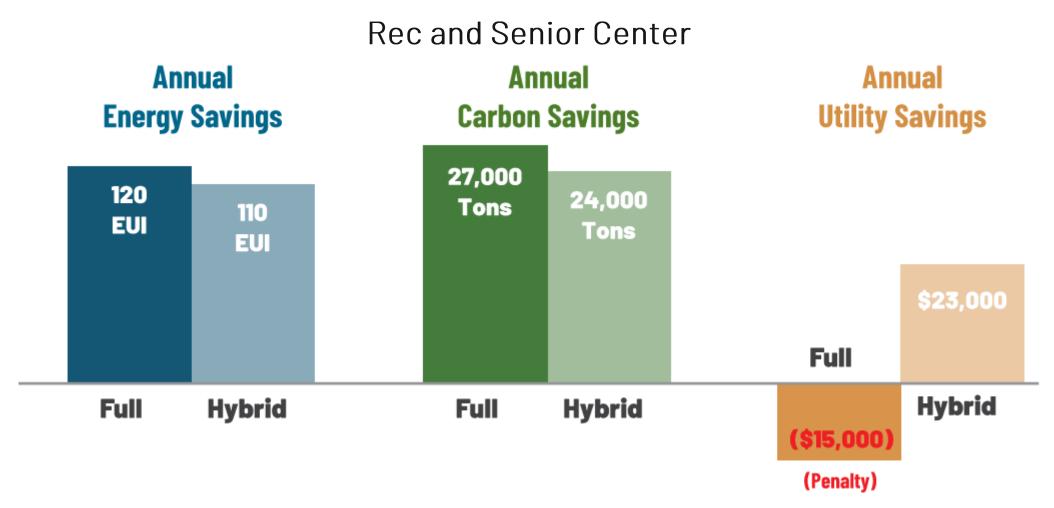

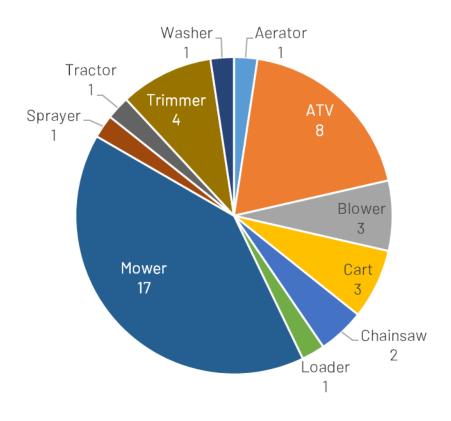
