May 2023 LCC Meeting Minutes

Please see Beth's notes on first few items

1. The meeting was called to order by JR at 6:30

2. Roll call- Beth McLennan, Erica Schmitt, JR Ketelsen, Sarah Staunton (arrived at 6:35), Sharron Nemechek arrived about 45 minutes into the meeting

3. Approval of this month's agenda: Beth motion to approve, JR second, no dissents

- 4. Approval of previous month's minutes: Beth motion to approve, JR second, no dissents
- 5. Public Comments: none
- 6. Chair Report-
 - This should be sent over by JR for Sarah/ Erica for more details of the minutes.
 - JR encourages that the LCC needs help in the fall for staffing and events.
 - Staffing for events in the summer and responsibilities- JR gives a brief overview of staff needed on average for the summer concerts.
 - Notes that parking/ car control does not have to be as strenuous as it has been in the past and that food trucks are pretty much self sufficient.

7. Informational item: Upcoming LCC and LCC Arts Grant events Erica

- Soul Penny Circus event are a bit lagging in their communications with her but we expect them to fulfill their proposed event obligations at the same quality as originally promised.
- Not All Men update: Their final event/ workshop will be held at Dana V. Music in Louisville.

8. Action Item: Discuss and approve modified Soul Penny Circus show (2023 Art Grant recipient)

- Need to move venues due to the nature of their event style. Erica still feels confident that the updated/ adjusted program will be of equal quality.
- Beth motion to approve, Sarah second, no disscents.

9. Informational item: Volunteer opportunities for upcoming events. (see Volunteer spreadsheet attached in meeting packet) JR

- LCC members are encouraged to add any ideas for more events to the list.
- JR requests that we have a knowledge of the existing budget to be able to move forward with booking events.
- Encouraging to bring helpers to events hosted by LCC.

10. Informational item: Summer Concerts in the Park (Bands, Volunteers, Food Trucks, etc.) (see Attachment) JR

- We will reach out to Lisa and Leah (former members) to see if they can help out this summer but especially for the 7/20/23
- Some of this already discussed in item 6

11. Discussion item: Cultural Caravan Fire Station event (June 8). Cultural Caravan Popup (date TBD). Shows, guidelines, roles, responsibilities.

- Everyone agrees that we do not need a table to showcase the LCC presence.
- JR notes some learned items that we need to be aware of for next year. Cultural Caravan seems to have a different understanding originally of when and how payments are made. Ex: in arrears? before event? etc.

12. Action item: Discuss and approve expenses for Sound System (see attachment)

- JR will do a bit more research and come up with the best mix of the two category options since the consensus of the LCC was that there are some items that we can mix and match from column option #1 and column option #2.
- We are approving a \$3,500 budget so as to accommodate for tax and shipping.
- Motion made by Beth to approve, Sarah seconded, no dissents.

13. Action Item: Set/Approve late Summer/Fall events (Crisosto Apache- \$300 request, Salome Songbird- \$600, Fresh Apples- unknown price (up to 499 so as to not need a LCC vote), Mark Diamond- proposed \$499, Mayan Healing Ceremony- under \$499), Jody Ash-(\$300)

- JR makes a motion for Salome Songbird approval contingent on availability for \$600 to do an event for the Center of the Arts. Beth second, no disscents.

14. Discussion Item: calendar through 2024

- JR mentions that we will need some of the special meetings to vote if any events come along that we want to approve.
- Erica encourages the LCC to think about 2024 schedule in general because there are a lot of other groups that have already started considering spaces to reserve.
- Erica notes that we can not pay artists until 2024 that we book in 2023 for a 2024 performance.

15. Action Item: set next monthly LCC meetings

- We take June and July off. JR makes a motion for the next meeting for the third Thursday of August.
- For June and July we will call a meeting as needed for voting on specific budget items etc.

16. Discussion item: Boards and Commissions – questions from City Manager (see attachment)

- What do you consider to be the purpose and role of your body? To be the cultural pulse of the city. To facilitate art grants programming and public art. Our purpose is to serve as volunteers to the cultural needs of the city and people of Louisville.
- **Do you have suggestions on changing that role in the future?** No changes to suggest.
- What have been your greatest successes? Summer concerts in the park, public arts process to use as future process, arts grants process.
- What about your greatest failures? Working on boosting programming that is not related to the summer concert- LCC see this as directly related to the lack of staffing and specifically for the 2023 term. The unfortunate resignations and events of earlier this year. Age diversity among the board could be improved- under 30 specifically would be great to see.
- How is your process to develop your annual work plan? How does it align with Council's work plan? - JR notes that he doesn't think that we have a current work plan. This can be seen in the hodge-podge of programming events. This would be something that we would discuss a retreat. Overall the LCC work plan is different from/ does not align with the Councils (simply by its nature).
- If the Council will be considering changes, what changes would you recommend? Concerns are that if we are consolidated as a committee, then we would have less members and thus less work getting done in terms of cultural events. The LCC has never held a workshop so that should be worked into our yearly schedule.
- **Do you feel that your body has been effective or ineffective? Why?** Overall over the past years, yes, we have been effective. Given this term's (2023) circumstances (lack of staff) we think that we have had an effective impact as well.
- City Council has an informal policy of managing meeting time and canceling or reducing meeting times when agendas are light. What are the practices of your body in regards to agenda development, meeting duration, and meeting tempo? We have some policies and procedures in place. The Chair thinks that we could speed up the meetings. We also take a few months break in the summer to manage the summers in the park. It is also suggested that in order to shorten the time of meetings we could have information items not be discussed but simply in the meeting packet for individual review prior to the meetings. Questions, comments or concerns can then be brought up as needed in the actual meeting.
- What is the ideal number of members for your board? At what point is the board too cumbersome, or too small? 8-10 members would be ideal. 3 is certainly too small. Anything less than 6, the staffing gets challenging.
- Should there be term limits? (Board members, or Board chairs). LCC believes that it should be required that a volunteer has to be an officer or on a subcommittee at some point in their term. Officers should have a term limit though the LCC is not certain about the specifics around this. Secretary will be a 1 year term and given to the most junior/newest of members ideally.

Public Art

"Community Resilience" by artists Rita Vali and Arabella Tattershall (City Hall sculpture)

- Artists have identified a structural engineer who can help them ensure that the sculpture will not tip over. The sculpture is approx. 8' tall, with an additional 2' height from the metal bird nest; weight unknown at the time of writing.
- Artists are working with the City to set up boxes at the Library and Rec. Center to collect community words about "resilience".

"Heart of the Community" by artist Darla Okada (Library Plaza mural)

- Is projected to finish by August 31, 2023.
- There will be a small Library event on August 27 with freeze pops as a way to engage patrons with the new Plaza and the art.

"South Street Sculpture" by artist Greg Fields (South Street pedestrian underpass)

- Requested carryover of LRC funds
- Sculpture placement is not confirmed. Sharon is working on:
 - Railroad protective liability insurance
 - Adjustment of the City's lease
- Sculpture would still need to go through public notice, an LCC vote, or City Council approval

Please describe the impact your event had on the community:

Numbers of individuals reached: 45,430 How did you attract your target audience?

The target audience was successfully reached through a comprehensive outreach strategy, including leveraging the power of social media, magazine feature stories, city website and communications, tapping into personal networks, collaborating with EDI-focused community groups, spreading through positive word of mouth and engaging with the diverse library patronage.

Did the activity generate any unexpected outcomes or impacts?

The revelation that individuals initially believed they lacked personal stories or experiences of discrimination, only to discover them showcased on the wall, was truly unexpected. Remarkably, many teenagers were unaware that what they perceived as uncomfortable comments are microaggressions and are in fact, part of the broader spectrum of racial injustice. This highlights the importance of fostering greater awareness and education to help people recognize and address issues of racial discrimination more effectively.

Was your organization able to achieve your program goals?

If yes, how? If not, what improvements can be made for future programs/events?

• Yes, by running events in spaces that people are already engaging in a conversation about race, healing and healthy. Libraries are among the most equitable, accessible, and inclusive



public spaces, serving people of all ages, races and socioeconomic backgrounds. Exhibiting Bubbling Up at the Louisville Library in November, and April through July allowed for exposure to a large number of people.

• Of 6 different ways to share Bubbling Up with others, 98% of people filling out the survey indicated they would share 3 or more different ways, suggesting that this will lead to an exponential number of conversations, amplifying the event's impact as it reaches and inspires a growing number of people.

Outcomes:

How did you measure your progress towards achieving your goals for this activity?

Progress is measured through engagement: bubble contributions, response contributions, survey results, interest in volunteering, guest book comments and conversations directly with people.

How do these measures show you made a difference in the local community?

Our measures demonstrate that a tremendous difference has been made for Louisville residents. The high levels of engagement, as evidenced by the substantial number of bubble contributions, response contributions and guest book comments indicate that Bubbling Up had a significant impact in the community.

Numerous conversations had directly with people reflect a deep emotional connection and inspiration, revealing how Bubbling Up resonated with individuals on a personal level, fostering a sense of empowerment and shared commitment to social progress.

The data and feedback collectively demonstrate that Bubbling Up has not only raised awareness but has also inspired real and tangible shifts in attitudes, behavior and community involvement.

Lessons Learned: Evaluations often reveal opportunities for improving programs/events. Did your organizations gain new insight to your program based upon lessons learned?

Identifying successful partnerships and collaborations during the project has led to meaningful alliances with organizations and individuals. Also, analyzing the success of different engagement measures has helped to pinpoint the most effective strategies for capturing participants' attention.

- Silenced narratives often just become and stay exactly as such a silenced narrative. Grace's brilliance and heart helped not just me, but evidently so many, many others unearth burdens of their heart.
- It was comforting to know people share this experience and I'm not alone.
- The authenticity of conversation around bubbling up with the grounding part of my experience today but it was SO powerful to uproot the memory that came up and that I got to get out of my system!
- I can imagine without this opportunity I might not have ever shared what I shared (and I may actually never have this opportunity again) but today I did and that's all that matters. Thank you, Grace and team.
- Thank you!!! You see me!!!
- This project is the gentlest, most powerful opening up of conversation about racial trauma l've ever heard of. I'm really grateful to have been invited to participate.
- This is a very empowering experience.
- I've never told those stories to people out outside of my inner circle of friends.
- It is so healing to know I am not alone. I don't have these conversations with anybody so I didn't know until I read others' stories that I wasn't alone in my experiences.
- Thank you for setting up this experience! Our community needs this.
- I think this is a great way to share experiences and create a sense of unity and solidarity. There's something so special about seeing that you're not alone and that each person has a unique experience yet somehow they create community.
- It's amazing and eye opening to express and digest experiences through a new form of expressing! Thank you for doing this!







Bubble Story Examples

When I was six years old I was walking home from school and some teenage boys hung me up on the fence post by the hood of my jacket then poured a bottle of white glue over my head.

As an Asian adoptee I'm told I'm "not Asian enough".

My ex's brother threw a noose at two black kids at his high school. It took everything to not strangle him. I can't believe this racism still exists.

In class I was asked to answer questions to represent all Asians and later put in a group called "Yellow Fever" by the same professor.

"You're so direct with your communication, I'm not used to that."

I married a white man so our kids are lighter in color than I am. People routinely address me like I am their nanny.

My sister was sprayed with hand sanitizer at her grocery store during covid.

Just because I'm black doesn't mean I'm going to rob you. Just because I'm black doesn't mean I'm uneducated.

Are you related to Bruce Lee?

When I was younger I wasn't invited to other kids houses because my dad is brown.

My mom is Puerto Rican and is prejudiced toward black people.

When a loaded shot gun was held to my head he said "You and your people are the problem with this country."

Why do I have to look Chinese in order to be Chinese?

I'm Mexican around my White friends. I'm White around my Mexican friends. When I can just be me??

I am a Tibetan and Japanese girl. I have been told my eyes are small, my lunch stinks and that I don't have a life outside of my after I beat a guy in a test. DO BETTER.

As a waiter I was asked if I was a Towel Head or Black. I'm Latino. The guest asked for another server. My manager told them to get out of the restaurant.

"If they can't afford a home that's their problem, it's their fault." – discussing economic disparities of minority groups and historic race-based policies in housing with my Father in Law and Mother in Law.

Is your dad a TERRORIST?

Response Card Examples

It is interesting (and horrifying) to see how white guilt shows up. On the board most of the responses are "I'm sorry and...something about me". Wouldn't it be great if white folks could just say "I see you".

I hate that these things happen. I hate that I have contributed to it. I hope someday it's better. Someday.

You belong. You matter.

You are SEEN. You are HEARD. You are VALUED.

I stand with you, I support you, I love you and you are NOT ALONE.

The only way for us to progress is for us to step back and do whatever is asked of us to help you step forward... I will do anything needed.

Thanks for these honest descriptions of what happens in our community. So often we want to deny this prevalent racism. But we must recognize and confront it.

Thank you for being vulnerable and sharing your experiences. Our shared pain empowers us to speak up, so future generations don't suffer, so future generations don't feel as alone. We belong here. Keep using your voices in the name of truth and justice. Transform pain into power.

Thank you for sharing your stories. This is an important reminder of how we can do better and try to love each other more.

I am often appalled by the hurtful actions of ignorance and fearful people. You have allies, you have people who care, you have people who want you to be celebrated for who you are. I'm sorry that we just haven't met yet.

I see you. I stand with you.

I might not be able to walk in your shoes, but I can take the time to track your footsteps and hear your story. Thank you for sharing and opening eyes.

My heart wants to hug your heart.

It is brave and vulnerable to recall, record and collect these stories of racism. Your voices are heard. Let's lift every voice 'til all beings are safe to live in their bodies just as they are.

This is important. Thank you for sharing. We all deserve respect and consideration. Each of us is unique. May empathy bring healing.

Thank you for sharing and believing our stories. It feels healing to know that I'm not alone.

Freedom is not freedom if only certain groups have it. I will fight for you, don't back down.

Guest Book and Survey Comments

It was a very nice and comforting experience. It helped me realize that my race is not a problem.

Silenced narratives often just become and stay exactly as such – a silenced narrative. Grace's brilliance and heart helped not just me, but evidently so many, many others unearth burdens of their heart.

It was comforting to know people share this experience and I'm not alone.

The authenticity of conversation around bubbling up with the grounding part of my experience today but it was SO powerful to uproot the memory that came up and that I got to get out of my system!

I can imagine without this opportunity I might not have ever shared what I shared (and I may actually never have this opportunity again) but today I did and that's all that matters. Thank you, Grace and team.

Thank you!!! You see me!!!

This project is the gentlest, most powerful opening up of conversation about racial trauma I've ever heard of. I'm really grateful to have been invited to participate.

This is a very empowering experience. It is so healing to know I am not alone.

I've never told those stories to people out outside of my inner circle of friends.

Thank you for setting up this experience! Our community needs this.

I think this is a great way to share experiences and create a sense of unity and solidarity. There's something so special about seeing that you're not alone and that each person has a unique experience yet somehow they create community.

It's amazing and eye opening to express and digest experiences through a new form of expressing! Thank you for doing this!

Thank you for the safe space to tell my story.

I shared a general story for today's exhibit – will surely follow up separately to go deeper. Thank you.

A man came up to me at the opening night of the exhibit and told me that he came to see what Bubbling Up was all about because his wife had just participated in a story-gathering event a few days prior. She came home wanting to talk about what she shared on a bubble, something she had never talked about before. Their conversation went deeper and deeper and he said it has positively impacted their marriage in ways he didn't even understand. They have been married for 10 years, have two children and this was a pivotal moment for them.
