- PPLAB members directed to communicate on own page with own opinions
- Next Door community pretty unhappy with proactive replacement of EAB affected trees. City planning replanting of canopy, 2 for 1 in places. End result will be new look for sustainable environment, see 88th for example.
- Median tree concerns: more canopy will come back, saving almost 1 million gallons of water after 50K sqft bluegrass turf to be removed
 - Did best to keep healthy trees
- Public Works: Ditch management also doing a lot of management, improve flow, and trees need to come out for that as well (Good Hue Ditch; Walnut Park Open Space to Heritage) - Cottonwood and Elms
 - Not done by City, by the ditch company
- O Large Cottonwood at 88th and Dillon needs to come down
 - Declined rapidly, needs to come down
 - Plans to remove this tree but other trees will immediately go in its place
 - Beehive is in there and will be relocated
 - If material is viable, can reuse some of the wood but may be limited
 - Remainder of unusable wood will be mulched
- Memorial tree program still activ Chris will plant 3 memorial trees this week. 2 will go in at Arboretum, one at the Sports Complex. Email Abby for application.
- Memorial bench program under discussion to be re-vamped (suspended for now)

Medians- update

 Much community consternation about tree removal (especially Ach trees affected by EAB, and traffic congestion along McCaslin median project

- Public lack of awareness. Messaging to the community includes a graphic sent out on the median project is a great start in communications. Additional outreach could include signs in affected medians informing public on timing and planned renovations
- On schedule to be done close to end of August on Via Appia
- Shifting to McCaslin in September
- Want a robust urban canopy, trying to replace 1-to-1 tree for tree
- Playgrounds- update
 - See attached packet
 - July 12th open house 40 at Joe Carnival, submitted 15 comment cards; >100 attendees at Meadows, submitted 26 comment cards
 - Mail listing from certain radius, QR codes also posted for survey
 - 1 more round of design concepts in September
 - Those in attendance gave comment cards and provided feedback on concepts presented
 - More details in Sept. on design process, park layout presented tonight:
 - Concept featured unirrigated grass, transition to Harper Lake across street. Play pit and large play area a possibility, timing and costs were considered at meeting, with good engagement from folks that showed up, play features and swings concepts explained
 - Both groups wanted areas for smaller kids
 - At Meadows Park, 52 attendees were from within a couple of blocks radius. Playground to focus on 5-12 age bracket. No restrooms, pickle ball or parking will be added (some misconception from attendees). Well

engaged community. Site plan to merge the two pay areas, some grass will be removed to make a giant play space, possibly accommodate the play tower setup preferred by attendees, maybe with swings, which will replace existing structures

 - West Nile case in mosquitos now in Boulder County
 - Subcommittee acknowledges that mosquitos are a serious problem due to the recent occurrence of West Nile case in Boulder County (note attached). Subcommittee interested in finding out more about mosquito management.
 - How does one get on an email list to be notified of spraying?
- O Pollinator-friendly environments: Ginger working with someone to put these together
 - Resources will be on website; will be great for replanting and rebuilding
- o 3-4 work plan items to promote in community
 - Replanting outreach for replanting and landscaping after fire and water-wise, pollinator friendly

We are writing as representatives of the City's Parks and Public Landscape Advisory Board (PPLAB) to express of our support of the reconstruction efforts and grant application process for Sunflower and Enclave Parks.

As a citizen group tasked with advising City leadership on the development and operations of our City's parks and public landscape infrastructure, we recognize the many challenges involved with reconstruction. In particular the financial constraints of the City's Budget given no FEMA and/or insurance reimbursement are available to offset available Capital Funds. In our opinion the potential grant funding would be a huge supplement to the rebuild efforts and ensure these parks deliver the amenities our community desires.

Hi Nick,

Marla Olson gave me your contact information in order to answer some questions our Bee City committee has about your mosquito spraying procedures in Louisville. Our questions are:

- -What time of day is mosquito spraying usually done?
- -What actions are taken to protect pollinators?
- -Are both fogging and misting used?
- -If so, what determines which procedure is employed?
- -And does that affect the timing of the spraying?

Our meeting to discuss this issue is Wednesday evening, so if you could get back to me by then, I would appreciate it.

VII. Pollinator-friendly planting: We reviewed the draft document that Susan wrote with suggestions from John and compared it to the version Ginger edited for the fall City newsletter. Susan noted that Ginger's version didn't include the caveat that people should obtain their plants from neonicitinoid-free nurseries. The committee agreed that this was important to include in the written document. Susan also noted that the link to the city's Bee City webpage that is listed in Ginger's version isn't live. [Post-

meeting follow-up: the Bee City webpage is now live, and Ginger has agreed to add the suggested neonic-free language.]

- 6) Local schools. Patricia will coordinate the art program, reaching out to elementary and middle schools. Josh will coordinate the idea of a student-designed pollinator garden. Centaurus has an Eco-Warriors Club. John will investigate.
- seed paper-making: As soon as Boulder County County Parks and Open Space has the program ready, Susan will organize, probably to take place in October.
- 8) Farmer's Market: Per Josh, the spaces are booked up for the rest of the year. Plan for next spring to book a space to educate the public about pollinator-friendly practices.

I made my initial inquiry when I was first raising bees in the summer of 2021, so the information needs to be updated, though the contractor IS still spraying during daytime hours. At that time, I expressed my concern that the contractor was spraying at a time when pollinators were most active. (10-2) Below are the pertinent responses from the then manager.

"We are an approved and licensed pesticide applicator with the Colorado Department of Agriculture. We adhere to ALL pesticide label requirements per State Law. We focus on cool shady areas where adult mosquitoes are resting during the heat of the day and avoid flowering plants where pollinators are active."

She said they were using Wisdom TC which belongs to the pyrethroid class of chemicals. "It's highly toxic to any arthropod BUT my technicians are Highly trained and careful in our applications. It is EPA registered as the LEAST toxic application to provide mosquito control."

The day they were scheduled to spray, it was breezy, though probably not above 10mph at which point, the instructions say not to spray. Mel did not answer my question about how they control drift, especially since they were spraying in close proximity to Coal Creek which put fish and invertebrates at risk, in addition to pollinators.

Here's general information from the Colorado State Extension Service that explains two approaches to using insecticides for mosquito control. https://extension.colostate.edu/mosquito-management/

"Adult mosquito suppression can involve two common approaches. The first is an areawide spraying or fogging to kill flying mosquitoes and, presumably, some mosquitoes resting on vegetation. This is best done during peak periods of mosquito flight, often around dusk with the [floodwater Aedes]. ?? Often a very short-lived pyrethroid insecticide is used for this purpose, such as resmethrin or natural pyrethrins. These break down very rapidly, usually within a couple of hours following application particularly in sunlight. Permethrin, a pyrethroid which has longer residual effectiveness is also used."

"Harborage area treatment involves insecticide application to areas where mosquitoes rest between periods of flight and biting activity. This is usually areas of dense brushy vegetation or tall grass. Insecticides with some persistence, such as permethrin or cypermethrin, are appropriate for this type of

application and may kill resting mosquitoes for a week or longer. Effects will be diminished with short-lived insecticides."

VCCI's own website https://www.vdci.net/colorado/ does not mention spraying during the daytime. The website says when they spray, it is done between dusk and dawn. "In order to maximize the effectiveness on adult mosquitoes, while minimizing exposure to non-target species, applications are timed to coincide with the non-activity period of beneficial insects such as bees and butterflies, and with the peak activity period of mosquitoes, which is from sunset through the early morning hours."

Mel said they only spray at night in an emergency situation. The distinction between spraying technique is apparently the difference between harborage treatment and fogging.


I found a draft document by the State from 2018 but it is mainly in regards to protecting nearby apiaries. It states that applicators should, whenever possible, time their spraying before 8:00 a.m. or after 6:00 p.m. and to use a non-ERI (environmental risk indicator) when possible.




